Where Would We Be Without Volunteers?

One of the things I have learned over the years is that local leaders are essential for any sort of river protection effort. It takes dedicated volunteers who live in the vicinity of the threat to defeat the evil schemes of those who would destroy our rivers. Here are just a few of the success stories related to the efforts of TRPA volunteers.

The Center Point Rockcrusher. Members John and Cayce Kovacs fought an ill-conceived Rockcrusher that was built on the banks of the Guadalupe River at Center Point. It looks like that rockcrusher may never operate. Read all about it on page 3

The Martindale Waterski Lake. The latest scheme to destroy our rivers involves the construction of water ski lakes on riparian property in order to sell waterfront lots on those impoundments. Sometimes landowners acquire a water right permit when they purchase these large tracts of land. Most of these permits were for irrigation of farmland and the permits generally haven't been used. But these new developers need all of the water they can get. Such is the case with the new Martindale lakes (see what they are doing: www.SanMarcosRiverRanch.com). The developer started pumping water from the river but was told by the TCEQ watermaster that the river was too low for him to pump (this was last summer – so far this winter he has been allowed to pump). So, when it became apparent that he would be stopped from pumping river water, he drilled a well right on the banks of the river and started pumping "groundwater". Of course, it wasn't groundwater (protected under the right to capture) it was river water. So we complained to the watermaster. But it is hard to keep the pressure on so many evil schemes at the same time. Fortunately, longtime friend and recent TRPA member Mike McClabb entered the scene. He was able to keep the pressure on the watermaster until the well was declared illegal and the developer told that he must remove it. Mike's willingness to keep up the fight paid off!

The Castroville Wastewater Plant. The city of Castroville has a really lousy wastewater plant and they currently are supposed to be using their effluent to irrigate farmland. But locals are convinced that most of it is making its way into the Medina River. The city applied for a permit to legally dump its effluent into the river, and local resident John Hall, called me and asked for help. I told him how to request a public meeting and a contested case hearing. We have done so, and the TCEQ appears to be bent on not allowing this hearing. But I am confident that we will win. And we will win because of folks like John Hall who just don't give up.

TRPA board members making a difference. No article praising volunteerism would be complete without mentioning some of our own board members. Like Steve Daniel, who almost single-handedly made it possible for the TRPA to purchase Hidalgo Falls and preserve the ability of paddlers to gain access there (page 2). Or Ed Lowe, who has been working tirelessly to clean up the Upper Brazos River (page 3) and has helped found the Friends of the Brazos to protect the flow and beauty of that river. Or Duane TeGrotenhuis, who has donated thousands of rental canoes to river clean ups over the years. Or Rich Grayson, who has donated many hours of time to setting up and maintaining web sites for the TRPA and other river groups. In fact, all of our board volunteers their time and money toward this organization. We have no paid staff. We do not pay for an office or phone. Almost every cent we receive goes directly toward river protection efforts. What about you? Are you involved in a battle to save a river? Well, get with it!

Hidalgo Falls River Festival Saturday & Sunday, March 21 & 22

The seventh annual Hidalgo Falls River Festival will be held March 21 and 22, 2009 at the TRPA Hidalgo Falls property on the Brazos River near Navasota. The festival, which is the year's major fund-raising event to maintain and improve paddlers' access to the rapid, typically attracts more than 200 paddlers and spectators. Dealer reps and outfitters will have boats and gear available for demos on moving water, and (based on past years) many boaters will come as early as Friday to enjoy the nice play levels on the river and to camp in the upstream and downstream campgrounds.

Events will include a 28-mile downriver race from Koppe Bridge Landing south of College Station to Hidalgo on Saturday morning, a "Boatercross" head-to-head elimination race through the rapids late Saturday afternoon, and a presentation by whitewater expedition kayaker Sam Drevo on Saturday night. World-class kayaker Dan Gravere will join Drevo for paddling clinics throughout the festival. On Sunday there will be a leisurely 3.5-mile float trip from Hidalgo to Hwy 105, a whitewater giant slalom race through the islands in the Falls, and a whitewater rodeo. During the downriver race on Saturday, festival goers can demo different kinds of boats, watch paddling videos, and play in the rapids. The festival admission fee is \$10 for the entire weekend, or \$5 per day; children under 12 are admitted free. Registration for the TCRA downriver race on Saturday costs \$25. The registration fee includes admission to the festival site, camping, opportunities to try out different boats and gear, and the chance to see Drevo's latest whitewater movie on Saturday night. Volunteers who provide at least eight hours of help at the festival are admitted free (contact Patti Carothers patti@paddlesports.com). Limited toilet and water facilities are available in the camping areas at the TRPA property. Motels are available in nearby Navasota.

San Marcos River Clean Up

24th Annual - March 7, 2009

On Saturday, March 7, folks from all over Texas will be participating in the world's longest river clean up. We will be picking up trash along the entire length of the San Marcos River (approximately 90 miles).

BANK CREWS

Everyone is urged to help. If you are unable to participate in the water, we need volunteers to work the banks of the river, especially at parks and highway crossings. Scuba divers and snorkelers are also urged to participate.

RECREATIONAL PADDLERS

The upper sections of the San Marcos River, particularly just downstream of the City of San Marcos, will require the most attention, and the short mileages set for these sections reflect this. Furthermore, the river becomes less accessible and more hazardous as one goes downstream. For that reason, novice boaters should volunteer for either section 1 or 2 and more experienced boaters for the other sections.

CANOE RACING ENTHUSIASTS

The lower river, from Luling to Gonzales, has several long sections with few bridge crossings and for that reason, we are asking canoe racers (especially teams that have competed in the Texas Water Safari) to volunteer for sections 9 - 11.

CAMPOUT AND GET-TO-GETHER

Everyone participating in this event is invited to camp free at either Shady Grove Campground/ Spencer Canoes or at Pecan Park Retreat for the weekend. Starting at 6 p.m. on Saturday evening there will be a meal provided by the San Marcos River Foundation at Shady Grove/Spencer Canoes.

SUNDAY WORSHIP SERVICE

On Sunday morning at 8 a.m., there will be a non-denominational Christian worship service at Pecan Park.

MEETING TIMES AND SHUTTLES

A group meeting will be held for everyone paddling the sections of river between Pecan Park Retreat and Luling at 9:00 a.m. Saturday morning at Spencer Canoes. The Center Point Rockcrusher

Several years ago we were contacted by some folks in Center Point Texas (just downstream of Kerrville on the Guadalupe River) about a rockcrusher that was being constructed right on the banks of the river and within about a mile of the local school. At first, it appeared that the owners intended to operate the facility without a permit, but local activists stopped that action. So the owners applied for a permit and the long process began. The first thing the public has to demand, in a case like this, is a Public Meeting, then a Contested Case Hearing has to be requested. Fortunately, John and Cayce Kovacs (and later Tom Collins) were willing to fight relentlessly and the TRPA offered money and other support. We established an earmarked account and began collecting contributions for the legal battles associated with such hearings. The contested case hearing was to begin on January 15. But, at the last minute, the applicant withdrew his request and the case ended. It is possible that the owners could start the whole process over again, but it would take several years to get to a hearing, so it seems unlikely. So, congratulations to the folks in Center Point and to those dedicated volunteers!
